• Europeans wanted a bar


- "Gassy" Jack opened a bar at the request of his friend, a mill owner

On Oct. 6, 1909, Charles Cocking took Vancouver's new "auto ambulance" out for its first test drive, and promptly killed a pedestrian.






The Historic Gastown Steam Clock

- Covered a steam vent, which powers the clock






The "Historic" Gastown "Steam" Clock

One of the engineers told The Sun Sunday that he had heard at 8 a.m. the engineers had stolen the gun.

But 8 a.m. was before the theft became public knowledge.

Most of the UBC engineers were on the campus Sunday preparing for today's festivities. They neither confirmed nor denied any involvement with the gun.

After removing it from its cage, the thieves hauled it up a grassy, snow-covered slope to the road near Brockton Point where, presumably, they had a truck waiting.

Park officials said it would take at least four strong men to lift the gun. Livingstone said it would



- Vancouver has a high concentration of immigrants from China, where fireworks are prominent (and were invented)






